An Author Visit with Kevin Hawkes!



Planning Your Visit - Frequently Asked Questions

Q. What does Kevin cover in his presentation?

A. Using manuscripts, original sketches, prose and paintings, Kevin will give your students a rare insider glimpse into the world of picture book creation.

Q. What grades are best for his presentation?

A. Kevin will tailor his presentation style to match the age group of the audience. Grades K-2 enjoy his funny stories, silly faces and drawing tips.

Grades 3-5 will take a closer look at drawing faces, hands and people. They will build a spontaneous story together. Grades 6-8 will focus on developing and drawing characters for their own stories. Kevin uses charcoal and markers as drawing tools.

Q. What is the ideal group size for the presentations?

A. Kevin is good at handling several classes at once but preferably not the whole school. We recommend a group size of 75-100 students. Kevin will do up to four presentations in a school day.

Q. What about the setting?

A. Attention spans tend to fill the space around them so a library setting is perfect rather than an auditorium or a gymnasium . Kevin prefers to have students seated on the floor and up close where they can see sketches and drawings best.

Growing up, I never thought I'd be an artist, I just loved to draw and paint. I drew just about everything I could think of: ships, castles, racecars, monsters and sharks. Art class was my favorite. When I was five, my family lived in central France and many of my childhood memories seem to find their way into my work: cobblestone streets, marshes and woods, grassy hills and Mediterranean skies.


My mother and father loved books. Mom was always reading bedtime stories and Dad entertained us (often from the driver's seat of a white rambler station wagon) with stories of dragons and giants. Some of my favorite books are the *James and the Giant Peach*, *The Chronicles of Narnia*, *The Secret Garden*, and all of the *Freddy the Pig* books.

In college I signed up for history and science. I took a few art classes too but nothing seemed to grab my attention. Then a friend suggested I take an illustration course. When I saw the art of N.C. Wyeth, Howard Pyle, Maxfield Parrish and many other great illustrators, I knew I was hooked. Although my work is often described as off-beat and quirky, I also have a love for traditional painting. Some of my favorite artists are Vermeer, Bouguereau, Caravaggio, and Sargent.

After college, my first art job was working as an assistant animator producing cartoons for Saturday-morning television. I was horrible! I had my own style and could never make it work with those cartoon characters. After three months I got a new job as a photographic retoucher. It was a good job because I learned how to do fine details in a realistic way. When my wife, Karen and I moved to Boston, I ended up in a bookstore working in the children's section. For two years I read picture books on every lunch break, studying the artwork. I began to get an idea of what books were really out there and in the evenings I started developing my own style of work. One day, with a portfolio filled with my favorite pieces, I set off on a train to New York to see a publisher about doing my own books. After a few tries, I got the contract for my first book *Then the Troll Heard the Squeak* and have been illustrating picture books ever since.

Now I keep busy doing picture books, chapter books, book jackets, and various art related projects. When I get the chance I enjoy landscape painting, especially at Acadia National Park. I also like to putter in my garden, and go hiking and camping with my wife and children.

I love to visit children in schools and to share my books with them. I once gave a presentation to a group of kindergarten children. Just before a reading of *Lady Bugatti*, one little boy in the front row blurted out, "This looks like a weird book, but I think I'm ready for it!" I enjoy creating books, especially new worlds for children to explore.

- 2. <u>Decide how to sell them.</u> Most schools have the students purchase specific books in advance by taking pre-orders. Another option is to have the students come with money and select their own titles on the presentation day. This tends to work better with older students. Some schools host a special evening or afternoon event for families and sell books there. In all cases, I would recommend that you sell the books at one price for hardcovers and one price for softcovers to keep things simple for parents.
- 3. <u>Consider a staff sale only!</u> Don't want a sale but still want books for your library and staff? That is fine we can offer the discounted rate for staff on the day of the presentation. No need to pre-order we will box up a selection of what we have on hand and let teachers have their pick!
- 4. <u>Plan time for autographing.</u> Of course, all books can be signed even personalized. We ask that you request "name only" and let Kevin decide what else to say. Sometimes he gets requests like: "To Velma we know you'll get noticed someday despite your app earance. Please don't slouch! Love, Grandma" (That is soooo un-cool!) Make sure you have scheduled time in the day for autographing, presentations and lunch too!
- 5. <u>Books are returnable!</u> All unsold books can be returned, usually with Kevin on the day of the presentations. If you decide you want the books prior to the school visit or to hold the books after the presentation day, you would be responsible for any shipping expenses.
- 6. Provide book sellers. In all cases, we ask that the school provide a librarian, staff member or parent volunteer to handle the money and actual sales of the books. This allows Kevin time to focus on his presentations, to talk to the students and to autograph the books. Checks can be written directly to Kevin Hawkes or if you pre fer, you can have the checks written to your school or organization and then write us one check. An invoice will be included with the books. We do ask that a final count of the books and the money received is done at the end of the presentation day.
